It is but 1½ inches thick and five of them can be set in t space usually occupied by two or three of the wooden Block

It will run perfectly true and not wobble as a common sheave is apt to, as it is almost impossible to set them true with the tools used by carpenters.

It is made entirely of metal and will not require lubricati as often as a common block, and when it is done the oil will rNo. 47–4½ inches long. be absorbed by the wood in a few days leaving the sheave run as hard as before,

It can be either screwed or spiked and taken up and a relegraph placed as often as desired without the least danger of breakin or wearing out the ends so that they will no longer hold a nail, No. 247—8 inches long.

It is the cheapest Block to use in the end as they will la forever, and a Theater once stocked with them will not haNo. 347—10 inches long. to replace their Blocks every two or three seasons.






